



Individuals Identified as a Clear and Present Danger As They Relate to the Firearm Owners Identification (FOID) Act

Statutes:

- 430 ILCS 65/8 (f)
A person whose mental condition is of such a nature that it poses a clear and present danger to the applicant, any other person or persons or the community;
* For the purposes of this Section, "mental condition" means a state of mind manifested by violent, suicidal, threatening or assaultive behavior.
- 740 ILCS 110/12 (b)
Requires the reporting of such information as may be required to determine whether an individual may be disqualified from receiving or retaining a FOID card. Entities that are required to report are;
 1. Physicians
 2. Clinical Psychologists
 3. Qualified Examiners as defined in Sections 1-120, 1-103, and 1-122 of the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities
 4. Information shall be furnished within 7 days

Procedure Flow:

1. Entities required to report notify DHS.
2. ISP Provides list of active FOID cards to DHS nightly.
3. DHS compares Clear and Present Danger information with FOID information and notifies ISP when they have a potential match.
4. ISP confirms the match and then denies or revokes the FOID card.
5. ISP sends a letter notifying FOID card holder of his revocation and provides information on how to appeal the revocation.
